

Fall Feasts

In Jewish tradition, the Feast of Trumpets is called *Rosh HaShanah*, a title that literally means "Head of the Year." It is called *Rosh HaShanah* because the first day of the seventh month is regarded as the biblical new year. The *Torah* refers to it simply as a "reminder by blowing of trumpets." It is a day of trumpet blowing.

Just as Messiah's second coming will be heralded by the blast of trumpets, the first day of the seventh month begins with an appointed time referred to as the Feast of Trumpets.

For disciples of the Messiah, *Rosh HaShanah* is a reminder of that appointed time yet to come when the Master "will send forth His angels with a great trumpet and they will gather together His elect from the four winds, from one end of the sky to the other." (Matthew 24:31). It is a day on which we anticipate the coming judgment, the trumpets of the book of Revelation, and the beginning of the end. It is a glimpse of the future, a shadow cast backward through time. As such, the Feast of Trumpets is relevant for everyone who believes in Messiah's return. 
This year, we were blessed with one of our very own youth to blow the shofar in commemoration of *Yom Teruah*, **Nathan LaMontagne!** He did a wonderful job! To G-D be the glory!



Yom Teruah stands as one of the most significant appointed times in Scripture, marking a day when the sound of the shofar pierces through time itself, connecting heaven and earth in a symphony of remembrance and anticipation.

This holy convocation, established in Leviticus 23:24 as "a memorial proclaimed with blasts of trumpets," carries within its ancient rhythms the heartbeat of G-D's eternal purposes for His people.

This year, during the *Yom Teruah* liturgy one line stood out to me like never before. The phrase *"may the sound of the shofar release gladness over our offering."* After a quick Google search, I learned it "links the celebratory, spiritual power of the ram's horn with the act of presenting a gift to G-D. It draws on several biblical and traditional Jewish concepts.




The Shofar's Spiritual Significance

The shofar is a simple but powerful wind instrument made from a ram's horn, used since biblical times

- Call to remembrance: The sound of the shofar calls G-D's people to remember key moments in their history, such as the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai and the binding of Isaac, which serve as a reminder of G-D's covenantal promises.
- **Spiritual awakening:** For centuries, the shofar's loud, piercing blasts have served as a "wake-up call," urging people to engage in introspection, repentance (*teshuvah*), and spiritual renewal.
- **Proclamation of G-D's Kingship:** The shofar is associated with the enthronement of a king and proclaims that G-D is King of the Universe. Its sound acknowledges His sovereignty over all creation

• Sound of joy and celebration: While the shofar is often associated with the solemnity of the High Holy Days, it is also used in joyful celebrations. Psalm 98, for example, says, "With trumpets and the sound of the horn, raise a shout before the L-RD, the King!"



The concept of "gladness over our offering"

The concept of offering is an ancient practice, and scripture links the sound of the trumpet to offerings made on feast days.


- Offerings of gladness: According to Numbers 10:10, a passage in the Torah, trumpets were to be blown "in the day of your gladness, in your appointed feasts... over your burnt offerings and over the sacrifices of your peace offerings." The sounding of the shofar adds an element of festivity and joy to the sacred act of sacrifice.
- Offerings of the heart: The phrase connects the external act of giving an offering to the internal state of gladness. True worship and giving come from a sincere and joyful heart. The shofar's call for spiritual awakening ensures that the offering is not just a ritual but is accompanied by a renewed spirit.
- Remembrance before G-D: The sound of the trumpets over the offerings served as a "memorial" before G-D. It is an act of worship that intentionally brings the offering to G-D's attention and remembrance, ensuring that it is received with favor.

In essence, the phrase is a spiritual plea. It is a request for G-D to receive an act of worship with favor, filled with the spiritual joy and sincere intention symbolized by the shofar's powerful, resonant sound." [Taken from various sources via Google Search]

October 18, Saturday


