A Chronological Table of Events — as narrated in the text, chapters 1–22

#	Reference	Event	Key Details
OPENING VISION			
1	1:1–20	Prologue and Vision of Christ	John, exiled on Patmos, sees the risen Christ among seven golden lampstands and is told to write what he sees.
LETTERS TO THE SEVEN CHURCHES			
2	2:1–3:22	Letters to the Seven Churches	Messages of praise, rebuke, and warning sent to Ephesus, Smyrna, Pergamum, Thyatira, Sardis, Philadelphia, and Laodicea.
HEAVENLY THRONE ROOM			
3	4:1–11	Vision of the Heavenly Throne Room	John is taken up to heaven and sees God enthroned, surrounded by 24 elders and four living creatures.
4	5:1–14	The Scroll and the Lamb	A scroll sealed with seven seals appears; only the slain Lamb (Christ) is worthy to open it.
THE SEVEN SEALS			
5	6:1–2	First Seal: The White Horse	A rider is given a bow and a crown and rides out 'bent on conquest' — traditionally read as conquest or a conquering spirit.
6	6:3–4	Second Seal: The Red Horse	A rider is given a great sword and power to take peace from the earth, so people slay one another — war.
7	6:5–6	Third Seal: The Black Horse	A rider holds a pair of scales; a voice names steep prices for wheat and barley, but oil and wine are untouched — famine and scarcity.
8	6:7–8	Fourth Seal: The Pale Horse	The rider's name is Death, with Hades following. They are given authority over a fourth of the earth to kill by sword, famine, plague, and wild beasts.
9	6:9–11	Fifth Seal: Cry of the Martyrs	Souls of those slain for their faith cry from under the altar, 'How long?' They are given white robes and told to wait a little longer.
10	6:12–17	Sixth Seal: Cosmic Upheaval	A great earthquake strikes; the sun turns black, the moon like blood, stars fall, and the sky recedes like a scroll. Kings and the mighty hide in caves.
11	7:1–17	Interlude: 144,000 Sealed and the Great Multitude	144,000 from the twelve tribes of Israel are sealed on their foreheads; an uncountable multitude from every nation stands before the throne in white robes.

#	Reference	Event	Key Details
12	8:1–5	Seventh Seal: Silence and Incense	Silence in heaven for about half an hour; an angel offers incense with the prayers of the saints, then hurls fire to earth amid thunder, rumblings, lightning, and an earthquake — introducing the seven trumpets.
THE SEVEN TRUMPETS			
13	8:6–7	First Trumpet: Hail and Fire Mixed with Blood	Hail and fire mixed with blood are hurled to the earth; a third of the earth, a third of the trees, and all the green grass are burned up.
14	8:8–9	Second Trumpet: A Mountain of Fire into the Sea	Something like a huge blazing mountain is thrown into the sea; a third of the sea turns to blood, a third of sea creatures die, and a third of ships are destroyed.
15	8:10–11	Third Trumpet: The Star Wormwood	A great star named Wormwood falls on a third of the rivers and springs; the waters turn bitter and many people die from drinking them.
16	8:12–13	Fourth Trumpet: Sun, Moon, and Stars Struck	A third of the sun, moon, and stars are struck so a third of the day and night are without light. An eagle cries 'Woe, woe, woe' — warning of the three trumpets still to come.
17	9:1–11	Fifth Trumpet — First Woe: Locusts from the Abyss	A star given the key to the Abyss releases smoke and locusts like scorpions. They torment — but do not kill — those without God's seal for five months, led by their king, Abaddon (Apollyon).
18	9:13–21	Sixth Trumpet — Second Woe: The 200-Million Army	Four angels bound at the Euphrates are released to kill a third of mankind with an army of 200 million, whose horses breathe fire, smoke, and sulfur. Survivors still refuse to repent.
19	10:1–7	The Mighty Angel and the Little Scroll	A mighty angel wrapped in a cloud descends with a little scroll, one foot on the sea and one on the land, and cries out with a loud voice.
20	10:3–4	The Seven Thunders	When the angel cries out, seven thunders 'speak' in reply. John is about to write down what they said but is told, 'Seal up what the seven thunders have said; do not write it down.' Their content is never revealed.
21	11:1–14	The Two Witnesses	Two prophets testify for 1,260 days in sackcloth, are killed by the beast from the Abyss, lie unburied for three-and-a-half days, then are resurrected and taken up to heaven as their enemies watch.
22	11:15–19	Seventh Trumpet — Third Woe: The Kingdom Proclaimed	Loud voices in heaven announce that the kingdom of the world has become the kingdom of Christ. The 24 elders worship; God's temple opens, revealing the ark, amid lightning, rumblings, thunder, an earthquake, and severe hail.
COSMIC CONFLICT & THE BEASTS			
23	12:1–17	The Woman, the Child, and the Dragon	A woman gives birth to a male child; the dragon (Satan) is cast down and pursues her.
24	13:1–10	The Beast from the Sea	A blasphemous beast rises from the sea, receives authority from the dragon, and makes war on the saints.

#	Reference	Event	Key Details
25	13:11–18	The Beast from the Earth	A second beast (false prophet) forces worship of the first beast and marks people with '666.'
26	14:1–5	The Lamb and the 144,000 on Mount Zion	The redeemed sing a new song before the throne.
27	14:6–13	Three Angels' Messages	Angels proclaim the eternal gospel, the fall of Babylon, and warnings against worshipping the beast.
28	14:14–20	Harvest and Vintage of the Earth	Christ reaps the earth's harvest; the wicked are trampled in the winepress of God's wrath.
THE SEVEN BOWLS			
29	15:1–8	Seven Angels with the Seven Last Plagues	Seven angels appear in heaven holding golden bowls filled with the wrath of God, about to be poured out.
30	16:2	First Bowl: Festering Sores	Poured on the earth; ugly, festering sores break out on everyone who has the mark of the beast and worships its image.
31	16:3	Second Bowl: The Sea Turns to Blood	Poured on the sea; it turns to blood like that of a dead man, and every living thing in the sea dies.
32	16:4–7	Third Bowl: Rivers and Springs Turn to Blood	Poured on the rivers and springs; they become blood. The angel of the waters declares the judgment just, since the wicked shed the blood of saints and prophets.
33	16:8–9	Fourth Bowl: Scorching Sun	Poured on the sun; it is given power to scorch people with fire. They curse God's name but refuse to repent.
34	16:10–11	Fifth Bowl: Darkness on the Beast's Kingdom	Poured on the throne of the beast; his kingdom is plunged into darkness. People gnaw their tongues in agony and curse God, but still do not repent.
35	16:12–16	Sixth Bowl: The Euphrates Dried Up / Armageddon	The Euphrates dries up to prepare the way for kings from the East. Three unclean spirits like frogs go out from the dragon, beast, and false prophet to gather the world's kings for battle at Armageddon.
36	16:17–21	Seventh Bowl: 'It Is Done'	Poured into the air; a voice from the throne declares, 'It is done!' The worst earthquake in human history splits Babylon into three parts, levels cities, and giant hailstones (about 100 lbs each) fall on people, who curse God.
THE FALL OF BABYLON			
37	17:1–18	The Great Prostitute and the Scarlet Beast	Babylon, 'Mother of Prostitutes,' rides a seven-headed beast; her corruption and coming destruction are revealed.
38	18:1–24	The Fall of Babylon	The great city is destroyed in judgment; kings and merchants mourn her collapse.
CHRIST'S RETURN			

#	Reference	Event	Key Details
39	19:1–10	Rejoicing in Heaven and the Marriage Supper of the Lamb	Heaven celebrates; the bride (the Church) is prepared for Christ.
40	19:11–21	The Rider on the White Horse	Christ returns as King of Kings, defeats the beast and false prophet, who are thrown into the lake of fire.
MILLENNIUM & JUDGMENT			
41	20:1–3	Satan Bound for 1,000 Years	An angel seals Satan in the abyss.
42	20:4–6	The Millennial Reign	Christ and the resurrected saints reign for 1,000 years.
43	20:7–10	Satan's Final Rebellion and Defeat	Released briefly, Satan deceives the nations one last time before being cast into the lake of fire forever.
44	20:11–15	The Great White Throne Judgment	The dead are judged according to their deeds; those not in the Book of Life are cast into the lake of fire.
THE NEW CREATION			
45	21:1–8	The New Heaven and New Earth	God makes all things new; the old order of sin and death passes away.
46	21:9–22:5	The New Jerusalem	The holy city, adorned like a bride, descends from heaven; God dwells with His people forever.
47	22:6–21	Epilogue	Christ promises to return soon; final warnings, blessing, and invitation are given.

Note: "Chronological" here follows the order events are narrated in the text. Revelation is apocalyptic literature, and interpreters differ on whether its visions depict a strict future timeline (futurist view), past events (preterist view), the church age symbolically (historicist view), or timeless spiritual truths (idealist view). Seal, trumpet, and bowl judgments are broken out individually below for detail. This table follows the narrative sequence most commonly used as a reference.
